**LIMERICK, — JULY 11.**

Yesterday, General Sir James Duff, inspected  
at Abington, the Royal Clanwilliam Cavalry,  
commanded by Hon. Jn. Maffy; — the Owna and  
Arva Cavalry, commanded by Captain Richard  
Waller, and the Cooagh Cavalry commanded  
by Captain Richard Lloyd.

Cornelius Ryan and Edmund Fannell, who  
were tried on the 29th ult. by General Court  
Martial, for conspiring to murder the Rev. Mr.  
Galwey, attacking his House and wounding him  
by discharging a loaded musket at him, — was  
sentenced to suffer death, which sentence was  
confirmed by the Lord Lieutenant; — but the  
Rev. Mr. Galwey having recommended them as  
objects of mercy to General Sir James Duff, he  
was pleased not only to forward the same, but to  
use his own interest in their behalf, in conse-  
quence of which the Culprits has had their sen-  
tence mitigated to Transportation for Life.

An Act received the Royal Assent the 20th of  
June last, which says, that three weeks from the  
passing the Act no person in Ireland shall sell spi-  
rituous liquors by retail on a Sunday, on penalty  
of Five Pounds; one half to the prosecutor, and  
the other half to the Church-wardens of the pa-  
rish. By this Act, no publican can sell spirits in  
Ireland to-morrow, (Sunday), or any Sunday  
hereafter, on any part of the day, without being  
liable to the penalty.

We have observed within these few days past,  
a mischief done to the Publick, which could only  
be perpetrated by those who delight in wicked-  
ness — that is, the throwing off into the River  
the Coping of the several Bridges in this City:  
As the Chief Magistrate will duly reward any  
person giving correct information against the  
Offenders, we hope shortly to announce that some  
of those nightly Despoilers may by sentenced to  
Regellation at the Cart's tail.

Yesterday Patrick Molony was executed at  
Abington, pursuant to sentence; his corpse was  
brought back to this city, and interred in the  
New Gaol Ground. — The two Keoghs were flog-  
ged by the Drummers of this Garrison at said  
place, and afterwards enlarged, — it is hoped that

torturing of their fellow-creatures in the same
