GLASGOW LIVE STOCK SALES.

GLASGOW, THURSDAY.

On Monday we had large supplies of cattle,
 while of sheep and lambs numbers were smaller.
 Sheep and lambs were easily sold at an advance.
 Cattle experienced a quiet trade, while Irish cows
 met the worst trade of the season. The supplies
 in open market on Wednesday were shorter all
 round, and a satisfactory clearance was effected.
 To-day (Thursday) we had again a sharp trade
 for sheep and lambs, while in the cattle ring,
 although there were plenty bidders, the prices of
 Irish cows were no better than those current on
 Monday. Our numbers this week were:—Mon-
 day, 175 cattle, 502 sheep and lambs; Wednes-
 day, 16 cattle, 205 sheep and lambs; Thursday,
 84 cattle, 175 sheep and lambs, and 1 pig. Total
 for week—275 cattle, 882 sheep and lambs, and 1
 pig. Official numbers in open market—346
 cattle and 5,719 sheep and lambs. This
 week's quotations—Best Scotch oxen,
 60s to 63s per cwt. Secondary and
 best Irish, 55s to 60s per wt.
 Best mutton, 7d to 7½d per lb; best Irish lambs,
 33s 3d each; seconds, 26s 9d to 29s 3d; mid-
 ling and inferior, 25s 6d down to 12s 6d each; 1
 cow, £6. At the Edinburgh Cattle Market yesterday
 336 store cattle were shown as compared with 249
 last Wednesday. Rain poured continuously all
 day, spoiling alike the attendance of buyers and
 appearance of stock. A trade similar to that of
 last week was experienced, a few lots not having
 found purchasers at the finish.
