### Sunday City Trip.

An exceedingly large number of people availed

## THE LATE MR JOHN DOWNEY

The funeral of the late Mr John Downey, whose  
death after a brief illness occurred at his residence  
in Mungret street, took place this evening from  
St John's Cathedral for Mount St Lawrence

quiet, unassuming citizen, one whose worth,

## FORESTRY IN IRELAND.

The first annual report of the Forestry Com-  
missioners states that up to September 30th last  
£69,091 was spent directly on forestry operations,  
of which £2,381 was spent in Ireland; 48,342  
acres of land were acquired, of which 3,170 were  
in Ireland (not including land previously acquired  
by the Department); 1,595 acres were planted, of  
which 202 were in Ireland. The total expenditure  
for the year was £12,776, of which £1,351 was  
spent in Ireland. Irish nurseries cover 21 acres.  
Of £8,513 spent on nurseries, Ireland's share was  
£493.
