A PROCLAMATION.

WHITWORTH.
WHEREAS we have received information upon Oath, that on the evening of the second day of July instant, Norton Butler, of Grouse Hall, in the County of Donegal, Esq. was wilfully murdered by a shot fired at him the said Norton Butler, which struck him in the Thigh, and that one Daniel Magennys was concerned in the perpetration of the said murder:

Now we the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, being determined as far as in us lies, to bring the said Daniel Magennys, and all and every of the persons or persons concerned in the said murder of the said N. Butler, to speedy and condign punishment, do hereby publish and declare, that if any person or persons shall within the space of Six Calendar Months from the date hereof, apprehend the said Daniel Magennys, and lodge him in any of his Majesty's Gaols, such person or persons shall receive as a Reward the Sum of Two Hundred Pounds.

And we do hereby also offer a further Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for the discovery of each and every of the person or persons concerned in the said murder, so as that he or they be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And we do hereby further publish and declare, that if any person or persons concerned in the said murder, (save and except the said Daniel Magennys, and any other person who actually fired at the said Norton Butler), shall, within the time limited by this our Proclamation, discover his or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so as that he or they be apprehended and convicted thereof, such person or persons so discovering, shall not only receive the said Reward, but shall also receive his Majesty's most gracious and free pardon for the same.

And we do hereby strictly charge and command, all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, and all other his Majesty's loving subjects, to use their utmost endeavours to bring the said Daniel Magennys, and all others concerned in the aforesaid murder, to speedy and condign punishment.
