COUNTY COUNCIL OF LIMERICK.

TUBERCULOSIS (IRELAND) ORDER OF 1913.

NOTICE.

THE attention of persons owning or having charge of cattle in the County Limerick is directed to the abovenamed Order of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland which takes effect from 2nd June, 1913, inclusive.

The Order provides for the slaughter by Local Authorities under the Diseases of Animals Acts in Ireland of (I) any cow which the Local Authority, after investigation in the matter, are satisfied is suffering from tuberculosis of the udder or is giving tuberculous milk; or (II) any bovine animal (bull, cow, ox or calf) which they have similarly satisfied themselves is suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation, and for the payment in such cases of compensation on a scale depending on the extent to which the animal is found, on post-mortem examination, to have been affected with the disease.

Under the Order every person having in his possession or under his charge (I) any cow which is, or appears to be, suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, indurated udder, or other chronic disease of the udder; or (II) any bovine animal which is, or appears to be, suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation, is required to notify the police of the fact without delay, and, pending the decision of the Local Authority in the case, to keep the animal isolated as far as practicable (Article 10), and, if the animal be a cow, to take certain precautions with regard to milk and milk vessels (Article 9).

The Order forbids movement to a port for shipment of any animal suffering, or appearing to be suffering from any of the forms of disease specified in the preceding paragraph, and prescribes steps which may be taken in the event of any such illegal movement, or in the event of an animal so affected being exposed for sale in a market, fairground or saleyard.
