**Limerick Aggregate Meeting.** 54  
 A Meeting of the Roman Catholics of the County and City of Limerick, held at St. Michael's Chapel on Friday, July 21st, 1815

*William Roche Esq. in the Chair.*  
 The following resolutions, proposed by James D. Lyons, Esq. and seconded by A. F. O'Neill Esq. were unanimously adopted:—  
 Resolved—That the Penal Laws, which continue to affect the Catholics of Ireland are not less oppressive to our Body than they are injurious to the union and stability of the Empire:  
 That we are determined to persevere with unabated and legitimate exertion for a full and satisfactory repeal of those degrading and impolitic Statutes, that we do therefore humbly but earnestly petition both Houses of the Legislature for an equal participation with our Protestant fellow subjects in the Rights and Liberties of the British Constitution.  
 [Here the form of the Petition was read.]  
 That the Petition now read be adopted as the Petition of the Catholics of the County and City of Limerick.  
 That a loyal and dutiful address be presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent praying his gracious concurrence in obtaining for us Legislative relief.  
 That following Gentlemen WILLIAM ROCHE, JOHN HOWLEY, JUN. JOHN EVANS, MICHAEL ARTHUR, and A. F. O'NEILL, Esqrs. be appointed a Committee to prepare the above Address, and submit it to an Aggregate Meeting to be held on Tuesday the 15th of August next.  
 That the most Noble the Marquis of LANSDOWN be requested to present our Petition to the Lords, and Col. O'DELL, aided by the Hon. WINDHAM QUINN to the Commons House of Parliament, and that these distinguished individuals merit our unabated gratitude.  
 That our Thanks are sincerely due to the Right Hon. Earl of DONOUGHMORE and Sir H. PARNELL the able and faithful Advocates of our cause.  
 Resolved—That our best thanks be given to the Bishop of Norwich for his enlightened Letter and paternal advice to the Catholics of Ireland, and that we shall ever retain a grateful sense of his eminent services to our cause, and that our Chairman be instructed to communicate this Resolution to that Patriotic and Benevolent Divine.
