Clonmel, July 27. On Wednesday and Thursday last the Rev. Dr. Butler of Thurles visited the parishes of Hollycross and Muckarky, and convened the parishioners, for the purpose of exhorting them against joining in those unhappy risings of the White Boys, or taking the oaths administered by them—Those of the parishes who met on the occasion, pledged themselves to each other, to exert in carrying his laudable admonition (as far as in their power) into execution—and having prepared for that purpose, when they heard the meeting of that day had been fixed on, for the purpose of swearing the parishioners to be loyal to them, and support their regulations.—Mr John Mannin, of Shanbally, with his friends and assistants, having got there at five o'clock in the morning, they proposed to him to take the oaths which they were then administering to a vast concourse of people, whom they had collected together on the occasion, to the number of 1000 at least.

Mr. Mannin, knowing many of them addressed them in the mildest manner in his power, to desist from their illegal proceedings, notwithstanding which they persisted in swearing the people, and told him he should also swear, which when he refused, they fired on him, and threw several stones at him and the people with him, and immediately surrounded and disarmed them, and most unmercifully beat and abused him, and them, gave him several cuts on the head, and almost knocked out one of his eyes, and beat one of the men with him to that degree that his life is still despaired of, and obliged him and them to take several oaths to them, and then proceeded to swear the rest of the parishioners; and from thence upwards of 300 of them went to the house of Mr. William Mannin, of Coollip, in said parish, in order to swear him, who locked and barred out his doors and windows, and most spiritedly withstood all their threats. They then threw several stones at the door, and broke his windows, when they could not enter to effect their wicked designs.

To be Run for over CORK DOWNS not Four miles from the City.

ON Thursday the 17th of August 50l. for 4 and 6 year old Horses, &c. 4 year olds to carry 7st. 12lb. 3 year olds, 8st. 12lb. 3 mile heats.

On Friday the 18th, a Buck Hunt in the morning, and in the evening a Hurling Match.

On Saturday the 19th, 50l. for real Hunters that never started for any Plate but a Hunter's Plate, and that have been actually used as Hunters the last Season, and not only to get the name, but really as Hunters to carry 12st. each, to be rode by Grooms, 4 mile heats, to be qualified by the oath of the owner if required.

On Monday the 21st, a Maiden Plate of 50l. for any Horse, &c. that never won the value of 50l. at any one time, (Matches excepted) 3 year olds to carry a feather, 4 year olds 7st. 12lb. 6 year olds 9st. 5lb. and aged 9st. 10lb. 4 mile heats.

On Tuesday the 22d, 50l. for Horses, &c. of all ages, 4 year olds to carry 7st. 5 year olds 8st. 6 year olds 8st. 10lb. and aged 9st. 4 mile heats.

On Wednesday the 23d, the Ladies Subscription Purse for the beaten Horses, &c. that save their distance.—Weights as for the Maiden Plate, 4 mile heats.

All Horses, &c. to be shewn and entered with the Clerk of the Course, at the Grand Stand upon the Race Ground, on the Thursday preceding the Races, between the hours of 4 and 8 in the afternoon, where each Groom, &c. is to produce proper Certificates of their ages from the hands of the Breeders, and declare what Plate or Plates they run for.

Proper Judges will be appointed each day, by whom all disputes are finally to be determined.
