DANGER TO CATTLE

The Minister for Agriculture desires to direct attention to the fact that recently cases have been reported of the poisoning of cattle from the eating of bracken or "fern." Stock frequently graze bracken infested pasture without ill effects, but in seasons such as this, when pastures in many areas are comparatively bare, the eating of bracken by cattle may have serious results. Farmers are, therefore, advised to take precautions to avoid loss from this cause, and to adopt measures for the eradication of bracken or "fern."
