

**OF MOST REV. DR. COYNE.**

It has been caused in Sligo and the diocese by the death of the Most Rev. Bernard Catholic Bishop of Elphin. Dr. Coyne is reported to be in his usual health last night. When going to his private residence in Mass on Saturday morning, he collapsed, and was taken to his residence. Dr. Rouse attended to him and at seven o'clock in the evening he died. Dr. Rouse and Canon Elphin were summoned, but he refused to attend, and at nine o'clock he passed away. Most Rev. Dr. Doorley, Bishop of Elphin, and Canon Elphin were with him throughout the night at his bedside when he died. Dr. Coyne was educated at Summerhill College, and at St. Patrick's College, Drogheda. After a term at Summerhill College, he was appointed Priest of Boyle, and in 1913 was created Bishop of Elphin.

His influence always was exerted for the cause of peace. During the struggle between the Republicans and the Free State he entered the Courthouse, Sligo, and threatened by the Republicans, he fled with the Free State troops. Republican forces withdrew from Sligo without making the proposed peace.

Dr. Coyne, who was 72 years of age, was buried in the field House, Roscommon.

**Farm Labourer Killed by Lightning.**

A heavy thunderstorm broke over Charleville and district in the early hours of Sunday morning and continued until after seven o'clock. On Sunday night thunder and lightning was followed by a torrential downpour of rain, which lasted through the night. Inquiries made yesterday morning elicited the fact that considerable damage was done in districts to the west of Charleville.

At Broadford, Co. Limerick, a farm labourer named William Dunleavy, aged about 50 years, was struck by lightning and killed outright. It appears that on Sunday night he was sitting by the fire with two neighbours, when he was struck on the head. The lightning bored a hole in the floor near the fireplace.
