One of the men is said to be badly injured.

INTIMIDATION CHARGE.

Case at Kiltrush Court.

At Kiltrush District Court, before Mr Fildes, District Justice.

The matter was reported to the Guards, who arrested the defendants.

Mr Traynor, for defendants, stated that the road was now finished and no harm could be done. His clients considered the Land Commission were wrong.

The Justice—The Land Commission are Government Department, and as a rule do not interfere only where they are right. Defendants looked respectable men, and if they gave an undertaking not to interfere with the place he would adjourn the case for three months.

The defendants gave the undertaking.
