THEATRE—Last night, the united attraction of Messrs. Incledon, Broadhurst, and Master Williams, aided by Mr. Hamerton, brought to our theatre a more splendid display of beauty, youth, and fashion, than, from the lateness of the hour at which the faces ended, and the shortness of notice given to the town, by the gentlemen concerned in the entertainment, we could have hoped to have witnessed.—The merits of Mr. Incledon, as a singer, have been too well known and too justly and frequently acknowledged, to require more from our pen, than an assurance, that his voice and powers retain their wonted excellence, he never sang the "Lads of the Village" or the "Storm" with more effect than last night.—Master Williams is a youth of more promise, than at his age, could be supposed—his sweet and cherub tones seem to have received the utmost cultivation of good taste and science, and when time and years have given them that strength and fullness, for which years alone is wanting, he must rank in the first class of fine singers.—Writing, as we do, immediately under the magic influence of Mr. Broadhurst's enchanting voice, we feel almost inclined to give up, as hopeless, the attempt to describe his talent, or do justice to his melody; his voice, soft, clear, and powerful as it is, is even less fascinating than the exquisite style and taste of his performance; his clear distinct utterance, both of the words and notes, fill the ear and hearts with their melody, leaving nothing to wish for, but that they could be thus delighted for ever.—Mr. Broadhurst possesses a peculiar grace in his singing, which seems to cast such a glory round the ballads which he sings, as would give them value to the mind of taste, were his selection less remarkable than it is for the beauty of their poetic composition, and the harmony of their airs; he seems to have rendered himself perfect in the science of music, only that he may know how to conceal its difficulty, and if the perfection of art is to appear like nature, the singing of Mr. Broadhurst is perfect in its simplicity and grace. Mr. Hamerton's task seems to be to connect the songs into one beautiful entire; he narrates many droll anecdotes, and recites many good stories, as introductory to each song, with much humour, and frequently an excellent Irish brogue.—On the whole, the entertainments of the night afford as exquisitely delightful a feast of reason and flow of soul as a union of taste, art, science, and melody could produce.
