The new edition of the "Almanach de Gotha" secords that eight German Princes have been killed in the war, viz, 2 Princes of Saxe-Meiningen 3 of Lippe. 1 of Hesse, 1 of Ruiss, and 1 of Waldeck. Further, a Prince of the Ducal House of Lichtenstein died of wounds received at the front.
