

Instructions to be observed by the troops if suddenly ordered to march, and on any named point.

Instructions of March, 1801, have pointed out the route in which the troops are required to march, and for which a moment's warning, and for which the Commanding Officers must undoubtedly have their respective corps.

Therefore provided with the country cartmen, &c. as prescribed by those instructions, and leaving every forbidden incumbrance behind them, they will march as possible together, in the small brigades or regiments into which they will be divided, agreeable to the particular routes and directions, which will immediately be forwarded from the General's Office, on the certainty of the enemy's approach. Such brigades will have each a commanding officer in rank for the time.

In the hurry of assembling the troops on the approach of an enemy, it may be impossible, in the first instance, to prescribe positive routes, and to prevent the troops from crowding, and interference, in the march, to so many bodies, moving from distant points, and tending to the same point. The arrangements of the senior officers, therefore, in the best manner, obviate such difficulties.

When the troops march in corps, and encamp, the more easily provided for; but when they are to be cantoned or hurried on, they must be provided with the most crowded and slightest discipline, and a rigorous discipline must be maintained, to prevent them from requiring more than the circumstances can allow.

Routes where troops are to march, sufficient head may certainly be provided in the first instance, on a short notice. Should this not be the case, the commanding officers are themselves to be the difficulty in the best general mode, and not permit individuals to trespass, or to be hurried on.

When the troops canton or encamp, a Commissary will be ordered to attend each brigade, to provide for the march, and to give every necessary assistance must be given.

There is no Commissary or Assistant Quarter-master, and that the pressure is such, that provisions, forage, or bread, must be had from the neighbourhood, the Commanding Officer must appoint one or more intelligent officers to act as Commissaries and Assistant Quarter-masters for the troops, who will go forward with proper assistance upon the Magistrate or Magistrates of the neighbourhood, and, representing the necessity of the case, as the only means of procuring property, and the regularity of the troops, to take such immediate measures, as will on the spot produce the necessary supplies, for all which the Commanding Officers of each regiment (should also
