NOTICE
 To Persons keeping Kilns for drying, or Mills
 for grinding Corn, Grain or Malt.

The Commissioners of Inland Excise and Taxes,
 hereby give notice, that by an Act of the 36th of the
 King, ch. 112, it is enacted, that from and after the
 first day of October next, every person who shall keep
 any Kiln for drying of any Corn, Grain, or Malt, shall,
 on pain of forfeiting Ten Pounds, in case of default,
 make out, sign, and deliver, an account in writing to
 the Gauger, or other Officer in charge of the Walk in
 which the Kiln is situate; and that every person who
 shall keep any Mill for the grinding of Corn, or grain,
 or Malt, shall, on pain of forfeiting fifty pounds, in
 case of default, make out, sign and deliver an ac-
 count in writing to the Collector of the District in
 which the Mill is situated, specifying and describing
 in such account respectively, the name and place of
 abode of such person, and the place where such Kiln
 or Mill is respectively situated, and shall cause to be
 painted in Oil Colour, in black upon a white ground,
 or in white upon a black ground, on the outside of
 the door of, or place of entrance of every such Kiln
 or Mill respectively, of on a board to be affixed on
 some conspicuous part outside of such Kiln or Mill
 in legible letters, at least three inches in length, the
 name and surname of the owner or proprietor of such
 Mill or Kiln, such account to be signed by the Gauger,
 Officer, or Collector, who is to give a copy signed by
 him, to the Party; and all Corn or Grain, or Malt
 found in or on any such Kiln or Mill respectively, of
 which such account shall not be delivered will be for-
 feited; and if upon any such Kiln or Mill, the name
 and surname of the proprietor thereof respectively,
 shall not be, and remain so painted and legible as
 aforesaid, the person to whom such Kiln or Mill shall
 belong, forfeits ten pounds, and before any such ac-
 count of any such Mill shall be received, the person
 keeping the same, shall with one or more sufficient
 Surety or Sureties, enter into a bond to his Majesty, in
 the sum of fifty pounds, conditioned to pay all such
 penalties as such person shall be subject to for having
 in the Mill any Malt for which such person shall not
 produce a proper permit for removal thereof, to such
 Mill; and that such person shall not receive or grind,
 or suffer to be received or ground in such mill any
 Malt which shall not be attended by a proper Permit
 to such Mill.

And the Act authorises any Excise Officer, at any
 time in the day time, to enter and search any Mill for
 the grinding of corn, or grain, or malt, situate in any
 district in Ireland, mentioned in any notice which shall
 have been, or shall be given by the Commissioners of
 Inland Excise, under the provisions of the illicit dis-
 tillation acts: and if such Officer shall not on demand
 or within a reasonable time after such demand made
 at the place of abode of the person keeping such Mill,
 obtain admittance therein, such Officer may (in the
 presence of a Constable, or other peace Officer: who
 is by the act authorised and required to aid and assist)
 break open and enter such mill and every store and
 room therein, and make search for any malt which
 such Officer may have reasonable or probable cause
 to suspect to be concealed or fraudulently deposited
 therein.
