

Sum — A second attack has been

ck commenced at about a quarter
 o'clock on Saturday night. Our
 consisting of 70 boats, was divided
 into three detachments: the first was commanded
 by Capt. Parkerville, of the Egenie; the second
 by Capt. Parker, of the Medusa. These divisions were
 composed of 6 ft bottomed boats, each of which
 carried a howitzer or carronade. The enemy
 was expected a second attack, and to
 be prepared for it. They had thrown up
 parapets and had sent a large reinforcement
 to the town. As soon as our divisions
 were sufficiently near the shore, a tremen-
 dous fire of grape and round shot was opened
 from the gun-vessels and shore batte-
 ries. The former had between one and 200 men
 each, and were well covered by flank-
 ing batteries of mortars. Troops, three deep,
 were sent for 3 miles.

The sailors advanced to the attack with
 great readiness and courage amidst this
 and boarded the enemy's gun-vessels.
 A fierce engagement ensued; but the decks of seven
 of the enemy's gun-vessels were cleared and
 taken possession of, but they could not
 be retained. The enemy had taken the precaution
 to connect their gun-boats to each other head
 to head by intermediate chains also fastened them
 to the shore. While our gallant countrymen
 were bravely trying to get them loose, they
 were subjected to a dreadful discharge of grape
 shot and musketry. At length they were
 obliged to retire, bringing with them one lugger
 and a schooner.

Readers may form some opinion of the
 nature of the loss which this lugger experi-
 ed, when we are told that only 14 men were left alive, and
 that 100 were wounded.

The number killed and wounded is estimated
 to be 1000 men. Capt. Parker, of the Medusa,
 an excellent officer, had his leg and thigh
 shattered. The Master of the Medusa was dread-
 edly wounded; the 2d. Lieutenant, and other
 officers were also wounded, and about 30 men
 were killed on Lord Nelson's ship. The Lieutenants of the
 Medusa, Lordborough, and Earl Spencer, were
 killed but not dangerously. Lieut. Fabian
 was shot through the foot.

Early in the afternoon Lord Nelson, in the Medusa,
 sent several cutters returned to the Downs,
 in order to reinforce his Squadron, or to pro-
 ceed to some other place, we know not. —
 The remainder of the Squadron was left off
 duty, between Verona and Padua, 18 vil-
