The Catholic Population of Dublin are in an extraordinary
ferment St Michael's, St John's, and St. James's Parishes
have met, and come to strong resolutions against the Veto,
under whatever shape it may be presented, or by whatever
authority it may be recommended.

The address of the second order of the Clergy to their
Prelates is couched in the same style.

And the Prelates themselves have agreed to a Remonstrance
to the Pope.

The following is the most striking resolution of St. James's
Parish:—

“ Resolved, That we now again renew the expression of
our detestation of this pernicious measure, and influenced by
the duties which we owe our religion, our country, and our
children, we thus publicly supplicate our venerable prelates
to tranquillize the public mind, so deeply agitated, and by
their final and explicit condemnation of every species of
Veto, to preserve to us, unimpaired, that for which our
Forefathers died, and for which, like them, we are ready to
sacrifice our properties, nay, our very lives ”

We give what appears to be a correct account of the Meeting
of the deputation of the Catholic Association to the Bishops,
in Synod.

WEDNESDAY, AUG 22.

The deputation having met this day, at the Rooms in Capel
Street, at the appointed hour, proceeded immediately to the
house of the Most Rev. Dr. Troy, in Cavendish Row. On
their arrival being announced, they were immediately ushered
into the room where the Synod was assembled—the Most Rev.
Dr. O'Reilly, Primate, presiding. The venerable body received
the deputation standing, and in the most kind and gra-
cious manner.

Mr. O'Connor, Chairman of the deputation, advanced to-
wards the table placed before the President, and addressed the
Primates and Prelates assembled, stating, that the public mind
being most deeply interested, and anxiously engaged, in the
subject now under their Lordships' consideration, the Catholic
Association felt it their duty to lay before the Synod the Offi-
cial Instruments which expressed the public sense and feeling.

It was the wish of the association to adopt the course which
would be esteemed the most respectful towards their Lord-
ships; and they would regret sincerely, if they had not suc-
ceeded in selecting such a course. Mr. O'Connor then read
the resolutions adopted by the Association at their Meetings
of Monday and Tuesday, which the venerable Member of the
Synod heard with the greatest attention.

Mr. O'Connell begged leave to add, that this information
was sought for by the Laity, merely to regulate their own
conduct; that nothing could be farther from their intention
than any species of interference with the duty of the Prelates;
on the contrary, they approached the Synod, on a subject the
most interesting to the feeling of every Irishman, with sen-
timents of respect and confidence, and would await the reply
in the same spirit. That reply, he said, would be received
by directing it to Mr. O'Connor, the Chairman, at the Asso-
ciation Rooms, No. 4, Capel street.

The Primate stated, that the Synod would immediately
take the communication into consideration, and send their
reply as soon as it should be agreed on.

The deputation then withdrew.

James Dixon, Esq. the Chairman of the Meeting held in
St. James's Parish, then presented the Resolutions of this
Meeting, which were most graciously received.

By an act passed on the 11th of July last, it is enacted,
“ That from and after the first day of August, 1815, all and
every person and persons whatsoever who shall have in his,
her, or their custody or possession any liquor made by infu-
sion, fermentation, or otherwise, from fruit of sugar, or from
fruit or sugar, mixed with any other ingredients or materials
whosoever, commonly called Sweets, or called or distinguish-
ed by the name of Made Wines, other than Mead, for sale,
shall be subject to the survey of his Majesty's Officers of the
Excise.”—Fines and penalties are to be levied and recovered
according to the Excise Laws, half for the King and half for
the informer. This Act appears to have been introduced at
the close of the Session, and to have passed both Houses
without an objection.

Tuesday, a Court of Directors was held at the East India
House, when Major General Sir Hudson Lowe K. C. B. was
appointed Governor of the Island of St. Helena.

Orders have been given to reduce the navy of Great Britain
to 12,000 seamen, and 5,000 marines. Twelve sail of the
line are to be kept in commission for guardships, and one
ship of the line for the East India station.

Lieut. Gen. the Hon. Sir J. Abercromby, K. G. C. B. is
returned Member of Parliament for Cheshamshire, in the
room of the Hon. Gen. Abercromby, who has accepted the
office of Escheator of Munster.

The election for the county of Armagh, in the room of the
late Mr. Brownlow, has not yet taken place, but is expected
to be decided in favour of the Hon. Henry Caulfield, brother
of the Earl Chatham, who has already represented that
county.
