

alarming fire burst forth, on Wednesday morning, large store of Carey and Co., extending from Half-street to Godsell's lane, Cork, which totally destroyed the entire concern, containing a quantity of glass and earthenware. The fire engines could only prevent from catching the adjoining premises.—The exertions of Major Townsend, of the 14th Dragoons, the Fire of the Night, were most conspicuous.

We are sorry to hear that Thomas Lenigan, Esq. died on Tuesday, at his house at Castlefogarty, County Tipperary. He was a gentleman much esteemed and respected, and will be lamented by all who knew him. A very awful instance of sudden death occurred in Killarney on Thursday, in the case of Captain James Wyse, of the Cottage in that neighbourhood, a very opulent and much respected resident.—The members of the sailing club of that town had met together in the News-room, to transact some transaction of the Club, on which Captain Wyse arose and expressed his sentiments, when he was taken suddenly ill and fell to the ground with much violence, and expired in a few minutes after. His head was much hurt in the fall, but it is supposed his death arose from the rupture of some of the vessels of the heart.

William Walter Fell, Esq. lately appointed a Stipendiary Magistrate at Manchester, was found dead in his room near Liverpool, on Tuesday morning.

Hallam, the celebrated author of the "View of Europe in the Middle Ages," has met with a serious accident at Killarney, by falling from a rock, near 12 feet high, on one of the islands of the Lake, by which his left leg-bone was fractured.

The rain which commenced falling on Tuesday, has continued with little intermission, producing a most destructive effect upon the country.—Previously nearly all the mills in this vicinity were obliged to suspend their operations from a want of water, and the consequence was a great pressure on the working classes, from the scarcity of the markets.

The rain has been general throughout Ireland this week.

The fair of Limerick, on Thursday, was not so crowded as might be expected at this period of the year, and the amount of rain during the day was unfavourable to business. Buyers were not many and the stock rather indifferent. There were numerous and in demand, but few of a good quality—fat cattle sold tolerably, and good Yearlings sold 5l.; Pigs also brought over 40s. a cwt.

The fair was disturbed at intervals by the noisy broils of drunken factions, who attempted to interrupt the regular business of the day. This quarrelsome disposition became more manifest towards evening, and when they found the police would not suffer them to make the Green a scene of riot and bloodshed, they adjourned by concert to Diamond-Gate, where a large party assembled to vent their passion for broken heads, but the Mayor made aware of the circumstance, followed with a detachment of the 26th Regiment and Police, seized a number of sticks and loaded whips, made some prisoners, and dispersed the rioters.

The fair of Rosegreen, County Tipperary, on Tuesday, was badly attended; good milch cows from 9l. to 10l.; yearlings from 3 guineas to 4l.; heifers from 2l. to 5 guineas; sheep from 29s. to a guinea and a-half.
