This and a late decision of his Worship's to the same effect, redound highly to his credit, and serve to shew the liberality and magnanimity that they cannot with impunity take those innoxious freedoms, of setting themselves above the persons to clothe and feed them.

COPY OF THE WARRANT.

By the Right Honourable William Downes, Lord Chief Justice of his Majesty's court of King's Bench, in Ireland.

County of the city of Dublin, } WHEREAS it appears to me, by information upon oath, that on the 5th day of July last, a number of persons assembled at Fishamble street, in the county of the city of Dublin, did propose and resolve that a committee of persons, professing the Roman Catholic religion, should be appointed to represent the Roman Catholics of Ireland, for the purpose, or under the pretence, of preparing petitions to both Houses of Parliament, for the repeal of all laws in force in Ireland, particularly affecting the Roman Catholics of Ireland.— And Whereas I have also received information on oath, that on the 5th day of the said month, divers other persons assembled in the Roman Catholic chapel in Liffey-street, in the county of the city of Dublin for the purpose of appointing five persons to act in such committee as aforesaid, as the representatives therein, of the parish in which said chapel is situate, and that at said meeting at Liffey-street, one Edward Sheridan was appointed one of the said representatives, and that Thomas Kirwan, Gregory Scurlog, Henry Edmond Taaffe, and Doctor John Breen, were four of the persons so there assembled, and that they and each of them then and there acted in such appointment of the said Edward Sheridan, to be such representative as aforesaid, against the form of the statute in that case made and provided. These are therefore, in his Majesty's said court of King's Bench, the bodies of the said Thomas Kirwan, Gregory Scurlog, Henry Edmond Taaffe, and Doctor John Breen, that they may be dealt with according to law, and for your so doing this shall be your sufficient warrant. Given under my hand and seal, the 8th day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eleven.

Francis Hamilton, and all or any of the constables of the said county of the city of Dublin and their assistants. Messrs. Thomas Kirwan, Gregory Scurlog, Henry Edmond Taaffe, Doctor John Breen, and Doctor John Joseph Burke, being arrested and brought in custody to the house of Lord Chief Justice Downes, in Merrion-square, by virtue of warrants under the hand and seal of the Chief Justice, and Mr. Carmichael, having attended on the part of Mr. Kemmis, Crown Solicitor, the persons so in custody required Mr. Carmichael to state to the Chief Justice that they had been taken into custody without any previous information, and that they were desirous of having an opportunity of advising with counsel as to the conduct they should pursue; and that time should be granted to them until to-morrow for that purpose. Mr. Carmichael said he would communicate what was so desired to the Chief Justice—and having gone up stairs, returned in a few minutes and said, that the Chief Justice's answer was, that he could not give such time. They then desired Mr. Carmichael to ask the Chief Justice if it was his intention to commit them to prison, in case they did not then procure bail to be given. NEW YORK, JUNE 27.

At one o'clock this day, the United States frigate President and United States, and the brig Argus sailed in company from this port.

JUNE 25.—Report of the pilots belonging to the pilot-boat Brothers, of this port, and sundry gentlemen on board the same, as to the capture of the brig Tomamaah, off Sandy Hook, by the British frigate Melampus, and the daring insult committed by the said frigate on the pilots and passengers of the Brothers, on Friday the 21st inst. viz:—That on the said Friday, at half past seven o'clock p. m. while coming in from sea, they descried a brig, which proved to be the Tomamaah, standing in from the eastward, and in pursuit of her was a frigate, supposed by them to be the United States frigate President, as she had the American ensign flying; then, supposing the said brig wanted a pilot, stood to her, and while in chase, saw 12 cannon shot fired from the frigate at the brig, which caused her to heave to; on coming up she proved to be the British frigate Melampus, and while in company, and within five miles of the Light-house, in eight fathoms and a half water, and without any provocation from us, the said pilots, or her passengers, the said frigate fired with intent to kill, at us, the said pilots, and our crew, a volley of musketry, and four balls therefrom went through the lower part of our main-sail, about five feet from the deck; they then stood off, and we saw no more of them that evening.

To all whom it may concern, Whereas it has been made appear to me, that John Griffith Bogert, Esq. has been appointed Vice Consul of his Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias for the State of New York:—

I do, therefore, recognize him as such, and declare him free to exercise and enjoy such functions, powers and privileges as are allowed to Vice consuls of such friendly powers, between whom and the United States there is no particular agreement for the regulation of the consular functions. In testimony whereof I have caused these letters to be made patent, and the seal of the United States to be hereto affixed.

Resolved, That we will promote, by every legal constitutional means, the repeal of those statutes, in their operation, divide the people, and degrade Catholics.

Resolved, That petitions to Parliament be prepared and that our tried friends in both Houses be requested to present the same, at an early period in the ensuing sessions.

Resolved, That the following gentlemen—Conrad Barry, Michael Arthur, and John Howley, Jun. are hereby appointed to prepare the said petition to Parliament for a redress of grievances; that the management and transmission of the same be confided to them, and that they be requested to co-operate with the general committee of the Catholics of Ireland.

Resolved, That our cordial thanks are hereby tendered to the general committee of the Catholics of Ireland for their firmness and activity in the Catholic cause, and to Lord Fingal, and such members as attended on the 31st of July, for their dignified and spirited conduct on that occasion.

Resolved, That the upright and patriotic conduct of G. Ledwill, Esq. and the other liberal and enlightened Protestants of Ireland, demand the expression of sincere and ardent thanks.

On the motion of Counsellor O'Gorman, it was resolved, that our thanks are due and are hereby tendered to Mich. Arthur, Esq. as one of the late committee, for his zealous and praiseworthy exertions in promoting the assemblage and object of this meeting.

Resolved, That our chairman is requested to transmit a copy of our resolutions to G. Ledwill, Esq.
