**Shortage in Free State**

From investigations made by an "Irish Times" representative during the last couple of days, it appears that there is every likelihood of a grave coal shortage in the Irish Free State during the coming winter. This shortage will be aggravated by the fact that peat, a good substitute, has not been harvested in sufficient quantities this summer to cope with increased demands likely to be made now that it has become known that there will be a shortage of coal.

Continental coal has been imported into Limerick for some time past. The Limerick Steamship Company have had several cargoes and another is due immediately. There is no immediate shortage, but the prices are high.
