## THE CITY BURNING FATALITY

Mr J S McNeice, City Coroner, and jury,  
opened an inquest yesterday at Barrington's  
Hospital into the circumstances touching  
the death of Nellie Ryan, aged 20 years,  
following burns accidentally received on the  
3rd inst., in a house at Thomas street,  
where she was employed.

Sergeant O'Farrell conducted the enquiry,  
and evidence of identification was given by  
John Ryan, Mungret street, City, who  
stated that his sister was a native of Long-  
stone, Dromkeen, and a domestic servant.  
He last saw her alive at Barrington's  
Hospital, on Saturday evening.

Dr W. F. Dundon, House Surgeon, Bar-  
rington's Hospital, stated the deceased was  
admitted to the Hospital on the 3rd suffer-  
ing from extensive burns to the body, arms,  
neck, and face. She died on Sunday morn-  
ing, death being due to shock from burns.

The Coroner adjourned the investigation  
until the 30th instant for the attendance of  
a representative from the Ministry of  
Industry and Commerce.
