catholics of Ireland.

ployment looked upon as a marked object of invidious  
jealousy, and having sought opportunity to forward a  
fatal purpose, he was, on his return from the fair of  
Gort on the above evening, way-laid by some inhuman  
monsters, who committed this horrid deed in the pre-  
sence of his distracted wife, who, after witnessing the  
dreadful transaction, was treated with such violent  
abuse, that she was yesterday morning scarcely reco-  
vered enough to see his remains conveyed to this city.
