

REVIVAL.

A movement is on foot to revive the Limerick Horse Show which lapsed for some years. In its day the show was one of the best in the country from the point of view of the number and quality of the exhibits, and from its social aspect. The initiative to again give the City its proper status in the matter has been taken by a band of well known enthusiasts, who are calling a meeting for the purpose at Geary's Hotel, Thomas street, on Saturday next, 25th instant, when it is expected that practical steps will be taken to launch a show next year.

DEATH OF MR E. B. BOURKE

The death of Mr Edmund B Bourke, which took place at his residence, O'Curry street, Kilkee, this morning, will be learned in the city with extreme regret. Mr Bourke had been ailing for a considerable time, and within the past month slender hope was entertained for his recovery. A native of Limerick, the deceased, who was in the sixtieth year of his age, was connected with commercial activities. He was for many years representative of the firm of Messrs Guy and Co, Ltd, before they went out of business in O'Connell street. Later he represented the firm of Messrs McClinton, soap manufacturers, Belfast, and held that position up to twelve months ago, when he was obliged to relinquish it consequent on impaired health. He was an ardent follower of sport, particularly of Rugby football and cricket. In social life he made hosts of friends, who regret his demise, and will extend sincere sympathy to his widow and daughter in their bereavement.

THE CAHERNORRY MURDER.

It is stated that the authorities are still without any tangible clues to the solution of the murder of John Conheady who was shot dead in his home at Cahernorry, Ballyneety, on the 19th July. DEATH OF SIR

Sir George Otto T Secretary for Ireland died at Cambo, yesterday morning.

The deceased baron's birthday on July 20, 1807, was celebrated to Parliament for 70 years, and was a member of the Ministry in 1868.

He was the only son of Trevelyan (1807-18) Indian administrator, sister to Lord Macaulay, the baronetcy in 1868.

He resigned from the Admiralty in 1870. When he came to power in 1880 he followed Frederick Cavendish, and Sir George was offered a difficult post of Chief Secretary. He held that office until 1885 when he was succeeded by Campbell-Bannerman.
