PUBLICANS FINED

Public sorrow at the tragic death
of Michael C. McNamara was mani-
fested on Sunday last when the
funeral took place from St. John's
Cathedral to Mount St. Lawrence
Cemetery. The cortege, one of the
largest to ever leave the Cathedral,
was representative of all classes
and creeds, and testified as to the
popularity which the deceased en-
joyed. On the coffin, draped with
the Tri-Colour, rested the decea-
sed's L.D.F. cap and belt, and his
service medal reminded the younger
generation that a member of that
gallant body who fought in the
Anglo-Irish struggle was about to
be claimed by the motherland as
God had claimed his soul. A guard
of honour, drawn from the L.D.F.,
marched on both sides of the
hearse. Leading the mourners,
under the command of Lt. R. Ryan,
were his comrades in the Signal
Company. Public bodies, sodalities,
sports clubs, comrades of the Old
I.R.A., all numbed with the shock
of his untimely end, marched
through streets lined with mour-
ners. We saw him laid to rest to
the sound of the fire of rifles held
in the hands of those who were his
comrades in that gallant struggle
of 20 odd years ago, while Volun-
teer "Bud" Clancy sounded "The
Last Post." Many a tear was shed
for "Giles," the patriot and the
sportsman, whose sunny disposition
captured the hearts of everybody.
The hundreds of Mass cards, the
many beautiful floral tributes, and
the numerous messages of sym-
pathy would entitle him to say with
justice, "Veni, vidi, vici."—R.I.P.
