One of the most injurious factors to our fisheries is to be found in the depredations of the poacher, who has no scruples in carrying out his hurtful designs. It is to be hoped that the Act will effectively check his operations, which are condemned by every right-thinking citizen.

THE WEATHER.

After a week's tension as to the intention of the weather clerk, the dark grey clouds which had been hovering about broke in the early hours of this morning, and rain descended copiously. It cleared up at mid-day, when the atmosphere was for a brief space of time bathed in sunshine, only to fade away again and give place to an overcast sky. The rain, however, kept off, but towards evening there was a distinct fall in the temperature, with the conditions rather unpromising.

THE REV. FR. CREAGH, C.S.S.R.

There was an exceedingly large congregation of members of St. John's division of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family in the Redemptorist Church last night, when the Rev Fr Creagh, C.S.S.R., a former Director, addressed the men. Fr Creagh, who left Limerick nearly twenty years ago for the mission abroad, gave a very interesting and instructive address on missionary work in the Philippines, Western Australia, and New Zealand.

ACCIDENT AT THE DOCKS.

While playing see-saw at the docks on Sunday evening a young lad named John Shanahan was thrown with considerable force to the ground, and sustained injuries to the head and back. He was removed to Barrington's Hospital in the Fire Brigade Ambulance, and detained for treatment.

SHANNON POWER SCHEME MODEL.

The model of the Shannon Power Scheme, which had been on exhibition in the Town Hall since the 23rd August, was removed last evening and sent on to Kilmallock, where it will be on view at the Agricultural Show to-morrow and following day. It is understood that the exhibit will not return to Limerick, but be sent on to Dublin from Kilmallock.

FATAL SEIZURE.

A man named Patrick Collopy, aged 56, by occupation a porkbutcher, had a seizure in Parnell street on Saturday night while returning to his home. He collapsed and was taken to a house nearby, where he succumbed in a short time. The Civic Guards at Edward street having communicated the circumstances to the City Coroner, he did not consider an inquest necessary in view of the production of a medical certificate that the man suffered from heart disease.

At Newport District Court, before Mr J M Flood. Timothy Ryan, Ballinahinch, was charged with having obtained by fraud £8 2s 3d unemployment benefit. Edward Ryan was also charged with obtaining £14 15s. Mr M'Grath, solicitor, Nenagh, who defended, pleaded guilty, and said the money had been obtained more through ignorance than dishonesty. The Justice made an order to have the money repaid at 20s and 30s a month respectively.

THE HOLIDAY SEASON.

There were noticeable indications at the railway station last night that the holiday season is drawing to a close. Nearly all the incoming trains which serve the seaside resorts, had their quota of returning holiday makers, and all bore facial traces of their sojourn at the sea. Kilkee, which is the Mecca for the vast number of Limerick people who favour a holiday by the briny, is rapidly being cleared of its visitors.

LIMERICK DOCTOR KILLED IN AUSTRALIA.

Dr Timothy J Ryan, who took his M. B. B. Ch. degrees in the N.U.I in 1923, was killed in a motor accident near Melbourne, when his car overturned. He was only 28. He left home in December last, accompanied by his sister, to settle in Australia. Dr Ryan's address is given as Killenure, Palla-green.

TIPPERARY OUTRAGE.

Despite exhaustive searches through the countryside for the author of the murderous attack on Patrick Moran, farmer, Ballyhurst, Tipperary, at his residence on Wednesday night last, the Civic Guards have so far been unable to effect an arrest.

At Mass, in St. Michael's Church, Tipperary, on Sunday, Archdeacon Cotter appealed to the people to give information to the authorities regarding the assailant.

TOURIST TRAFFIC.

Sir Felix Pole, General Manager of the Great Western Railway, visited Cork on his return from a holiday at Killarney. He expressed an intention of keeping Killarney and Glengariffe prominently before the holiday-going public in England. As a result of representations made to him at Cork, special day excursions to Cork are being arranged to leave Cardiff and district on the 15th and 22nd instant.

AGED INVALID'S HOME BURNED.

A thatched dwelling at Rathkeenan, Clonmel, was burned on Saturday. An aged woman, an invalid confined to bed, was removed in time by neighbours. Some of her effects were saved.
