### HON. M W. HOGAN.

#### Distinguished Limerick Man's Death.

Hon. Michael W. Hogan, 72 years old, one of the oldest practitoners at the Chicago Bar, died on Saturday, August 17th, at his home, 1578 Jackson Boulevard, Chicago, after an illness of ten days. His death occurred while he was surrounded by members of his family, among whom were his sons, Fire Attorney Frank J. Hogan, and Attorney Thomas S. Hogan. Michael W. Hogan was born in Limerick. In 1848 he went to the United States and found employment with the New York Tribune. Later he went to Chicago and studied law at Northwestern University. He was admitted to practice in 1854. One of his first fees was earned by copying a legal document for Abraham Lincoln. At the outbreak of the civil war he moved with his family to St. Louis, Mo., where he remained until 1886. While there he was three times elected State's Attorney, several times City Alderman, and was once elected a member of the School Board. In 1886 he returned to Chicago and practiced law for several years, until forced to retire because of poor health. He is survived by his sons, Frank J. and Thomas S., and the Misses Mary and Stella Hogan, Mrs. John Burke, of Baltimore Md., and Mrs. George J. Flanigan. Funeral services were held at Our Lady of Sorrows Church, Jackson Boulevard and Albany Avenue, Monday morning at 10 o'clock. After the services the body was taken to St. Louis for burial.
