## MURDER OF A LIMERICK MAN IN MEXICO.

Intelligence has reached Limerick of the murder of a Limerick man in Mexico. Some six or seven years ago a man named John Houlihan, from the Blackboy Pike, left his native city for America. It is stated that he was working on a railway in Mexico, and while asleep in a tent with others was shot dead by a man named Dempsey. The latter was followed by about 100 men, who threatened to lynch him, but he was rescued by the authorities and lodged in jail. He now declares that he had no intention of shooting Houlihan, but mistook him in the darkness for a man who was unfriendly to him.

### THE DOON MURDER.

To-day Colonel Tynte resumed, within closed doors, the magisterial investigation into the circumstances connected with the Doon murder case. Further evidence was given to incriminate some of the accused with the attack on O'Connell. Dr. Joseph Fitzgerald, Cappawhite, deposed to making a *postmortem* examination of the deceased. Death was caused by an incised wound right through the heart, inflicted by a knife or some sharp instrument. There was also a bruise-mark on one of the deceased's arms, and he might also have been struck with a stick or a stone on the head, but there was no mark. Police evidence was given as to the arrest of the accused, and the inquiry was adjourned to to-morrow week at Limerick.

### PROTECTION POST FOR KNOCKAREA.

After two attempts on his life, the authorities deem it necessary to have police protection given to John Cotter, and a hut is being erected close by his residence at Knockarea, Dysart. Both the Leahys, who were on the spot at the time, positively state that neither of the men they saw wore any disguise.
