#### WEDNESDAY—THIRD DAY.

This day, Henry Neille and Thomas Hehir were also  
tried, for the Dillons' murder—Bridget Dillon, in her exami-  
nation, has proved that Neille assisted in dragging her father's  
body out to the road, after being murdered; and that Hehir  
was the man who went into the house for the bayonet with  
Scanlan, when her mother was shot, at four o'clock, the Jury  
gave in a verdict guilty, against Neille and Hehir—they are  
to be both hanged this day. The Crown Lawyers have  
declined proceeding in the trials of any more at present; and  
in consequence the Juries are discharged.

We never recollect to have seen trials conducted with so  
much humanity towards any unfortunate wretches; the  
most discriminating and patient investigation in any  
thing that could tend to their favor was evinced by the Bench  
and the Counsel, and the clear chain of evidence adduced,  
which led to conviction, was brought forward with much  
ability by Mr. Barrington the Crown Solicitor.

Wednesday morning, Patrick Scanlan and Patrick Burns,  
in pursuance of their sentence on Monday, were executed at  
Gallows Green.

Thursday, Bryan Sheehy and Henry Evans, were executed  
at same place.

And this day, Henry Neille and Thomas Hehir, were also  
executed at Castletown, with three others a few weeks since  
—all for the horrid murder of Thomas and Margaret Dillon,  
at Castletown, Barony of Kenry, in Sept. 1815—for the  
unwearied exertions in the apprehension of whom, the thanks  
of this county are due to the Rev. Francis Langford, and the  
Rev. Thos. Westropp, of Ballynolan.

John Toomy who was convicted on Saturday, at the session  
under the insurrection act, is to be sent off to Cork on to-  
morrow, for embarkation.

On Sunday last, Lieut. Saunders, with a party of the Royal  
Artillery, proceeded to Killaloe, where he was joined by the  
military there, and from thence to Belkelly Castle, in the  
Shannon, the celebrated den for illicit distillers. On their  
arrival the persons at work in the castle, threw all their appa-  
ratus, &c. into the Shannon, and escaped from thence in small  
boats. On Monday, Lieutenant Saunders, with his party  
(accompanied by several of the neighbouring gentlemen)  
returned to the Castle, and blew up that part of it, where the  
whiskey was made for many years, the walls of which were  
immensely thick, being eight feet some inches. It is now  
rendered incapable of protection for those illegal distillers in  
future.

**LINEN TRADE.**—We are happy to find that a Meeting  
was a few days ago held of the County Gentlemen, at which

Odell in the Chair, to take into consideration the necessity of  
promoting the culture of hemp and flax and extending the

was burglariously broken into by an armed party of  
Bauditti, about the hour of Two o'Clock in the morn-  
ing of Thursday the 22d August 1816, with an avowed  
purpose of murdering the said L. J. Kiggell if found  
therein; and several articles of plate and apparel,  
together with 25 pounds in Money feloniously stolen  
thereout, and several articles of furniture broken to  
pieces.

Now for the purpose of discovering the perpetrators of such  
outrage, we will pay ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, for the  
prosecuting and convicting, within the space of Six Calendar  
Months, from the date hereof, each of the first four of them  
taken, and Fifty Pounds for such private Information as may  
effectually lead to such conviction. And we will pay the
