The facts are that a Meeting was called for the purpose of Contracting on the 28th of August; Seven Commissioners not having attended. the Meeting was adjourned to the First of September, on which day, Eight Commissioners met; the lowest proposal for the Lighting Contract was 29 Shillings per GLOBE, the next was from the same Person at 30 Shillings and 6 Pencee, he engaging to employ a Fifth Lamplighter the better to ensure satisfaction to the Parish; the Tried was 32 Shiftings and 6 Pence, the Fourth at 33 Shillings and 6 Pence was sent in by the person who held the Contract in the year 1813. Three out of Eight Commissioners agreed with me in the opinion that the proposal at 30 shillings and 6 Pence ought to be accepted, as the Security offered was unexceptionable; but the fight of the GLOBES in 1813 blazed so bright in the ' minds eye" of the other Four Gentlemen, that we could no get them to agree with us. In vain did we urge, that it would make £75 difference to the Parish, that the times were bad, and taxation heavy - In vain did we remind them that the Contractor for 1813 was appointed in consequence of his proposal being 6 Pence under that of his predecessor, against whom there was no compliant-In vain did we argue that it would be mere mockery to advertise for proposals if the highest was to be preferred, but the twinkling lustre, the vivid blaze of 1813 seemed to effect the mental faculties and to averpower the wanted perspicuity of the four dissenting Gentlemen; thus matters stood for some time, Four against Four, at length it was asked, what was to be done? I then proposed that we should adjourn for a few days, and that in the interim a preference of the Contract might be offered to the favourite proposer at 30 Shillings and 6 Pence, which I conceived to be the utmost favor that he was entitled to, however this suggestion was not agreed to, and, for the first time during my experience as a Commissioner, the Chairman exereised his privilege of giving a second vote. I regret that that the precedent has been made, as I fear it will give additional encouragement to the growing practices which I am sorry to think already prevails too much in the management of the affairs of the Parish It remains with you to form your own opinion. I can only hope that you will do me the justice to believe that I have endeavoured to perform my duty on that occasion. I cannot conclude without again and again assuring you that any evils you have to complain of are entirely attributable to the neglect, the apathy, or inefficiency of the Fourteen Commissioners for life, some of whom do not reside in Town, more scarcely ever attend, and many more but very seldom - It consequently often happened that I was summoned to attend on very urgent business and after losing an hour or more of my time, obliged to adjourn, a second and third time, though perhaps thirty or forty minutes would dispose of the business to be done, I must here remark that I often complained that two vacancies should be suffered to remain unfilled nearly TwelveMonths, as if it was desirable to encrease the difficulty of procuring a regular meeting of the Commissioners ; thereby placing too much responsibility in our Secretary, who, by the way, is also our Treasurer; indeed by such shameful neglect of the Commissioners, he is almost Chamberlain of our new Corporation. I would there fore, earnestly recommend the Parishioners to be particular in their choice of Seven Commissioners to be elected on the 29th of this Month None should be appointed but those who are likely to strend strictly and regularly to your interests .-It only remains for me to assure you, that if I am again cho sen, and undertake the obligation of a Commissioner, it will be more from a feeling of duty to you than from any particular ambition on my part for the importance attached to the
