## IRISH AIR TRAGEDY.

### Co Limerick Man Victim.

### A Brilliant Military Career.

Commandant Thomas Moloney an old R.A.F. pilot, who was killed during the Irish Army Manoeuvres near Kildare, on Tuesday, was the son of a County Limerick farmer. He was born on the 16th January, 1899, at Shanagolden, and was educated at St Peter's, Freshfield, Lancashire, and St Munchin's College, Limerick; Maguire's Civil Service College, Dublin, and Birmingham University.

During the war he joined the British Army and served in the Yorkshire Regiment, but was later transferred to the R.A.F., and after passing out of the Cadet School, was "gazetted" as a Lieutenant and Air Pilot. During the fighting on the Western front he had many narrow escapes from death. He served there for over eighteen months—an extraordinary long time for a flying officer—ascending regularly and specialising in bombing of the German lines. Returning to civil life he was appointed a surveyor of taxes in the Inland Revenue Department, but threw up his appointment during the trouble and served as a pilot in the Free State Air Force at Baldonell for three months. He then acted as O/C of the Air Service at Fermoy, from October, 1922, to January, 1923, before being brought back to the headquarters of the Free State Air Force at Baldonell.

Commandant Moloney always evinced the greatest keenness in his work as an airman, and only three months ago volunteered to attempt the Atlantic crossing from Ireland to the United States in a Martinside six-seater passenger machine.

### The Funeral.

The funeral passed through Limerick to-day, for Shanagolden, where the interment took place. The remains were conveyed from the Curragh by motor, and the coffin was covered with a number of beautiful floral tributes. Accompanying the funeral were several military officers, members of the Flying Corps, and as it wended its way through the city the military stationed at the New and Castle Barracks, with reversed arms, joined the cortege, the band playing the Dead March in Saul. There was a large number of motor cars carrying mourners from Kildare, and the deceased officer's native place, and other parts of the country.
