LIMERICK,—SEPTEMBER 26.

The Sentence of Death passed on Robt. Campbell, tried some weeks ago by a General Court Martial, for having a quantity of Ammunition in his possession, has been changed by the Lord Lieutenant, to Transportation for Life.

As the Rev. Mr. Quinlan, of Banfagh, Co. Tipperary, was officiating at his Chapel on Sunday the 20th inst. six men, well armed, broke into his house, and from thence to his bed-chamber, (where his arms were deposited), and there-out took three guns and a pistol; Captain Ryan, of Tipperary, having received information of the outrage, immediately assembled his corps, who are remarkable for their spirited exertions, and dispatched them in different directions, a detachment of which apprehended three of the gang, and lodged them in the Bridewell of Tipperary; one of whom, when taken, had in his possession a powder-buff.

Sunday night, Terence Brien, Butcher, having an altercation with his Father, Daniel Brien, in the town of Tipperary, gave him a stab of a knife in the throat, of which wound the unfortunate old man immediately died.
