Prince Bismarck is reported to have suggested
that a treaty should be arranged between the Vati-
can and St. Petersburg on the same basis as the
German one. The Prince has offered himself as

A telegraph from Belgrade states that the de-
fected Bosnia insurgents are taking refuge by
thousands in Servia. Already 6,000 have arrived
and 4,000 more are expected.

Heligoland. The charges made are utterly
unfounded, and unsupported by the islanders, who
testify to their happiness under British rule.
