COUNTY CORK RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Many Waggons Wrecked.

A goods train loaded with pigs from
Bantry fair got derailed near Colomane,
about six miles from Bantry, on the Bantry
and Drimoleague line, on Thursday.

It appears that three or four waggons on
the back got disconnected from the main
portion of the train. This was not dis-
covered until the disconnected portion col-
lided with the main portion going down an
incline, causing a number of waggons to be
overturned. A large number of pigs were
killed and injured, and the line was com-
pletely blocked.

The Post Office despatched the night mails
from Bantry by special car to Drimoleague
Junction, to connect with the train from
Skibbereen to Cork.

DEATH OF MR THOMAS CLEARY.

The death took place on Thursday of Mr
Thomas Cleary, an old and highly-esteemed
resident of Thomondgate. The deceased,
who had attained the age of 75 years, was
father of Mr Thomas Cleary, B.C., with
whom and the other members of the family
sincere sympathy is felt in their bereave-
ment. The funeral to-day to Mount St.
Laurence Cemetery was largely attended,
and testified to the regret felt at the passing
of a respected citizen.
