admitted, but they would not be in a position to pay any large amount in compensation.

Mr. Dore said plaintiff could have claimed a much larger amount in the Circuit Court, but he was anxious to avoid incurring heavy expense.

Plaintiff, in reply to Mr. Dore, said that as a result of the assault he was idle for three weeks and as a result he lost £6. He also had an engagement at the time to give a violin recital on the Radio Eireann programme but he could not keep that appointment as one of his fingers was injured as a result of the assault and he was claiming £1 damages in respect of that. He also estimated that he suffered a loss of £5 owing to having to cancel a cinderella dance which he was to have held in his hall on the 29th June. He had paid £1 for doctor's attendance and 10/- for medicines, etc., making a total of £13 10s. He was satisfied, however, to reduce his claim to £10.

Mr. Dore—We are not claiming anything in respect of pain and suffering arising out of the assault.

Mr. Cussen—I don't think you can claim anything under that heading, unfortunately.

Answering Mr. Cussen, plaintiff agreed that the cancellation of his Radio Eireann broadcast was merely a postponement but at the time he had done a good deal of rehearsal in preparation for the broadcast.

Mr. Cussen said the facts were admitted and there was no answer to the assault. He congratulated plaintiff on the reasonable amount of his claim for medical expenses.
