In a desperate fight between two violent factions, yesterday, at the fair of Dromin, near Bruff, stiled the "three and four years old," three men were killed on the spot from gun-shot wounds, and another died this morning. The parties were armed with scythes and fire-arms. Several more are most dangerously wounded, from fractured heads and limbs. The Coroner, Mr. Bennett, went this morning from Bruff to hold inquests. The Police heard the shots distinctly, but could not interfere, not having a Magistrate to guide them.

A Private, named English, of the Royal Artillery, was beat so severely at the Race-Course, yesterday evening, that his skull was fractured, and his life is in imminent danger.

On Thursday, two men were drowned, by the sea surrounding them while standing on a rock, under the cliffs of Moher, in the West of the Co. Clare.

Mr. Bindon, Chief Constable of the County Clare Police, who was so seriously wounded by stones, in a contest with the country people at Glanomara, on Sunday last, is nearly recovered from the bruises he received in several parts of his body. The assailants had the effrontry this week, to send a messenger to Mr. Bindon to challenge the entire police and military to an open contest on Sunday next, stating that they were well prepared for them and would give them "fair battle."

The Sheriff of the County Kerry, has received orders to transmit the following female convicts now under rule of transportation in Tralee Jail, in pursuance of the sentence passed on them viz:—Judith Finnigan, Ellen Day, Catherine Corey, Mary Shanahan, Mary Rillihan, Honora O'Brien, and Mary Sullivan (otherwise Shea or Dirreen.)

The 42d (Royal Highlanders) are ordered from Dublin, to embark for Cork, for Gibraltar, to relieve the 64th who are coming to England.

The first detachment, including the Staff, of the 1st Regiment, or Royal Scots, marched into Newry on Friday, from Castlebar; and on Saturday morning, the two companies of the Rifle Brigade, which relieved the 63d Regiment lately quartered there, left that place for Belfast.

The First Division of the 24th Foot embarked at Devonport on Wednesday for Cork; the other two divisions will not embark till next week.

The second division of the 32d Regiment, from Corfu, arrived on Saturday at Plymouth, in the Princess Charlotte transport.

Two companies of each of the three Veteran Battalions are ordered to be disbanded forthwith.

A detachment belonging to the 7th Fusiliers marched yesterday morning, from Westminster for Dover.

A colour sergeant of the 17th Regiment, now lying in Edinburgh Castle, deserted last week, with a considerable sum of money belonging to his company.

### LIMERICK INSOLVENT COURT

Yesterday, at 10 o'clock, Mr. Commissioner presided in the Record Court, for the relief of Debtors. There were thirteen cases in the City in the County, all of which were disposed of at 10 o'clock. The petition of the first that was brought forward, was dismissed, John Dusey, it appeared collusive arrest, and that he really owed no money to the detaining creditor.

Denis Tuohy, was discharged without opposing creditor, Michael Clancey—assignee, J. Richard Humphrys, discharged without opposing creditor, Pierce Lacy—no assignee.

James Fahy, discharged without opposition—Keeffe, detaining creditor.

Michael Duseen, discharged without opposing creditor, Arthur J. Preston, detaining creditor—no assignee.

Michael Fitz-Gerald, discharged without opposing creditor, Rev. Arthur J. Preston, detaining creditor—no assignee.

Daniel Cunningham, was opposed, and remanded for six months, at the suit of Roy and Co., and Co., brewers, for not giving a fair return of his Schedule.

Patrick Raleigh, was opposed by the wife, representative of Charles Magee, remanded for six months for vexatious and unnecessary opposition.

Michael Walsh, discharged without opposing creditor, A. J. Preston, detaining creditor.

James M'Donnell, discharged without opposing creditor, Connor Cunneen—no assignee.

William Kelly, was opposed on behalf of O'Donnell.—Insolvent is a Cornet on half-pay Dragoon Guards at 58l. per annum; is married, a family; his debts were small, and chiefly for domestic necessaries. It appearing to the Commissioner that an honorable principle always influenced his proceedings, and that every disposition was evincing a desire to satisfy his creditors, which was acknowledged by the Commissioner thought it rather severe to deduct from his half-pay; under these circumstances he was ordered to be discharged. The principal was a gentleman who bore voluntary testimony to his faith—Detaining creditor, Jane Bourke—A. Nicholson, of Dublin.

Thomas Halpin, petition dismissed, but no settlement with his Creditors.

Of the eleven persons, all are detained, merely for a few days, in consequence of delay or omission as to the receipt of some of their debts.
