EXECUTION OF MICHAEL HANLY.

Yesterday being appointed for the execution of the
culprit, Michael Hanly, convicted at last summer
assizes of this County of the wilful murder of his wife,
Mary Hanly (with Mary Fahy, the wretched partner
of his guilt, whose execution has been stayed until
the 2d of January next, only in consequence of the
woman being pregnant) he underwent the extreme
penalty of the law, upon the drop in front of the
County prison. For the last 20 years a greater con-
course of persons did not assemble to witness a simi-
lar revolting spectacle, there being at least 20,000
congregated on the occasion—principally females
—while no sympathy whatever was evinced for
the unfortunate man whose life was about to pay the
forfeit of the crime he had committed; on the con-
trary it was universally regretted that Mary Fahy was
not to appear upon the scaffold at the same time to
suffer death for the atrocious tragedy which she parti-
cipated, and is believed to have been the principal.

At two o'clock Hanly having been pinioned by
Murnane, the hangman, was led from the cell in which
he had been confined, to the place of execution, ac-
companied by the Rev. Wm. Bourke, Roman Catho-
lic Chaplain of the gaol, the Rev. Messrs. Bunton
and Quinlan. He carried a crucifix in his hands,
walked with a firm step, repeated the responses to the
litanies in an audible tone, evincing perfect resignation
to his fate, and fervid religious devotion. He slept
soundly the night previous, yesterday morning
attended mass in the gaol, and received the Com-
munion at the hands of the Rev. Mr. Bourke. On ap-
pearing upon the scaffold he knelt for some time in
prayer, with his back to the crowds assembled, and
the finisher of the law having placed the rope about
his neck, and the cap upon his face, at a given signal
the fatal bolt being drawn, the wretched man was
launched into eternity.

The fall being great he died after a few convulsive
struggles, and the body after an hour was lowered into
the coffin in which the remains were to be interred
within the prison. He made no declaration what-
ever either to the gaol officials or upon the scaffold as to
his guilt or innocence.

Michael Hanly's execution yesterday was the first
ever seen in Limerick without the aid of a military
guard present.
