THE MURDERS AT DONERAILE.

We feel no ordinary satisfaction in announcing the arrest of sixteen persons—eleven men and five women—on strong suspicion of being concerned in the atrocious and savage murder of Canning and Cummins, the Tithe Valuers.—They were apprehended in the neighbourhood of Castle-pooke, the scene of the foul deed, and have been lodged in the bridewell of Doneraile. The Magistrates, Military, and Police are on the alert, and it is said that all the parties engaged in the murder are known, and before a few days pass over will be in custody. The Government has offered a reward of Three Hundred Pounds for the apprehension of the wretches. The town of Doneraile is crowded daily with country people, who appear very uncomfortable at the situation to which they have reduced that part of the country by their lawless and sanguinary conduct. On the return of the widow of the ill-fated Cummins from Buttevant, where the wangled remains of the father of her numerous offspring were interred, some heartless miscreants collected outside her door, yelling No Tithe.
