

RECENT ADARE SHOW.

A Great Success.

At a meeting of the Committee of the Show, the Chairman, Mr L Kirpatrick, presiding, Mr A. Byrne, Onagh, Enniskerry, Co. Wicklow, wrote that if the Committee decided to hold sheep dog trials at next year's Show he would offer a Cup to be competed by novice dogs owned by residents in the County Limerick. The Committee accorded thanks to Mr Kirpatrick, and accepted his kind offer. The statement of accounts presented by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr McNamara, showed the receipts, including Cinderella dance, amounted to £247 0s 5d, and the expenditure £149 11s 3d. A sum of £100 was voted towards the expenses of the County Limerick Branch of the Dairy Shorthorn Breeders' Society. On the motion of Mr Hanley, seconded by Mr Nolan, a vote of thanks was passed to the Earl of Dunraven for placing his demesne at the Society's disposal, and gracing the Show with his presence. The members present mentioned that his lordship had left his important duties in England in order to be present, which showed his great interest in the district and its industries. Thanks were extended to Messrs Peter Kirpatrick, A. P. Pollok, and J. Ryan, who had acted as judges in the jumping competitions.

DEATH OF JUDGE C. F. DOYLE, K.C.

Intelligence of the death of Circuit Court Judge Chas. F. Doyle, K.C, which took place rather unexpectedly at his residence 4 Clyde Road, Dublin, this morning, was learned today in his native city of Limerick with extreme regret. A wire conveying the sad news was received by his sisters from the Rev Father Hocke, C.C., Haddington Road Church, who was with him before his death, and administered the last Sacraments. Judge Doyle was son of the late Mr Daniel Doyle, solicitor, and brother of Mr James A Doyle, solicitor, and of the late Mr Daniel S. Doyle, solicitor, and Assistant Registrar General. He was born in 1866, and received his early education at Crescent College, afterwards going to Clongowes College, and then to Trinity College, Dublin, where he graduated M.A. He was called to the Bar in 1888, and took silk eighteen years later. Before being appointed County Court Judge of Mayo in 1910 he enjoyed a lucrative practice, and was Professor of the Law of Property and Contracts in the National University. On the passing of the Courts of Justice Act a few years ago he was transferred as Circuit Judge of the Counties of Wicklow and Kildare, and in the discharge of his duties he showed marked ability and impartiality. He was married to a daughter of the late Mr James Haran, Manager of the Limerick Branch of the National Bank, and has two sons, one a student at Clonliffe College, and the other a Bank official. The late Judge Doyle was a man of charming personality, kindly and considerate towards everybody, and he occupied a pre-eminent position in his profession. In the years anterior to the war he frequently visited Limerick and lectured at the Catholic Literary Institute.
