Mr J J Comyn appeared for the applicant, and Mr A Blood-Smyth, solicitor, for the respondents, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

As the necessary notice was not served on the respondents, his Honor affirmed the decision of the magistrates.

In the appeal of Daniel Kenneally, a farmer, who was fined £10 for cruelty to a horse by the magistrates, Mr A Blood-Smyth, solr, said he had received notice from the other side withdrawing the appeal.

The penalty was accordingly affirmed with 40s costs.

CITY TRAGEDY.

Yesterday morning the dead body of Patrick O'Connell, Margaret's Place, City, aged 35 years, and employed as a night watchman by the Grand Canal Co., was discovered near Lock Mills, by some men going to work. On examination it was found that there was a deep gash in the throat, and a carving knife was picked up near the body. The remains were removed to Barrington's Hospital, where an inquest was held last evening by Col Williamson, R.M., Mr H Dickenson, R.M., and a jury, into the circumstances connected with the tragedy. The evidence showed that when the body was discovered there was a gash in the throat severing the principal artery. It was stated that on another occasion deceased attempted to commit suicide by throwing himself under a motor car.

The jury found that deceased died from wounds self-inflicted whilst temporarily insane.

DEATH OF MR GEORGE FERGUSON.

Many friends in the city and elsewhere will regret to learn of the unexpected death of Mr George Ferguson, ex-sergeant R.I.C., which took place this morning at his residence, Rosbrien, after a short illness. Indeed he was out and about a few days ago, but his health had not been of the best for some time past. Mr Ferguson, who was in his 79th year, had a long and honoured service in the Royal Irish Constabulary, and in his earlier years was stationed in William street, Colcooney street, and Ballinacurra. For some fifteen years he was in charge of Newtown Station, Ballynoe, Co Cork, and here he retired from the service in 1899. Wherever he was located he was highly esteemed for his courteous and genial disposition, and the news of his demise will be heard of with sincere regret by all who knew him, and who will deeply sympathise with his family in their sorrow. The funeral will take place at 3 p.m. on Thursday from his late residence to St Mary's Cathedral.
