SINGULAR AND UNFORTUNATE EVENT—Last week some individuals, natives of Ireland, brought into the town of Stafford a quantity of pigs with an intent to dispose of them at the Wakes Fair, held at that town, but not being able to do so, they obtained permission to lodge them in a stable belonging to the Union Mill, in the Lower street, which had been before occupied upon similar occasions. It having rained heavily on the preceding day, the animals to the number of 106, were wet when housed, when the steam arising from their bodies, together with the circumstance of the door being closed upon them by a person whose fowls roosted in the stable, produced suffocation, and 80 were found dead in the morning; 22 fowls out of 25 shared the same fate.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHITWORTH.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the 54th year of his Present Majesty, entitled, "An Act to provide for the preserving and restoring of Peace in such parts of Ireland, as may at any time be disturbed by seditious persons, or by persons entering into unlawful Combinations or Conspiracies;" it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Justices of the Peace of any county, assembled at an extraordinary Session of the Peace summoned in manner by the said Act directed and pursuant to the provisions therein contained, not being fewer than seven, in a county, or large or than three in a County of a City or Town, or the major part of them, if they see fit upon due consideration of the state of the county, to signify by memorial by them signed to the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, for the time being, that they consider the county, or any part thereof, to be in a state of disturbance, or in immediate danger of becoming so, and the grounds and reasons of such their opinion, and praying that the
