unplayed itself in his conduct on
the trial of Mr. Odium for the late cruel and
dangerous attack on his person.—Mr. War
button seemed wholly attentive to the case and
preservation of the prisoner, who with the
concurring testimony of the High Sheriff him
self along with others, was clearly proved to
have been insane, at the time he attempted the
assassination.

As all the criminal prosecutions as are at the
suit of the Crown, it very frequently rests with
the law officers of Government, whether to
indict for a capital offence, or for a misbehavi
our only. Now if several of the White-boys
already tried and convicted might have been
capitally indicted, from the excesses and vio
lences committed, surely the lenity of Govern
ment must be allowed, to have had them in
dicted for misdemeanors only, and consequently
subjected on conviction, to a much less punish
ment than might otherwise have awaited, from
several late outrages, the heinousness of their
conduct.

The grant made by the King of Spain in his
convention with our monarch, that has lately
been ratified, of liberty for his Majesty's sub
jects to cut down and purchase mahogany on
the Spanish main in America, must be very
acceptable to the cabinet makers of these king
doms as the Jamaica woods are nearly ex
hausted, as well as those which lay near the
sea shore on the coast of Honduras.

Cork, Oct. 9. This day the Right Hon.
the Lord Chief Baron, Mr. Justice Henn and
Mr. Serjeant Toler, Judges of Assize, ar
rived in town from Tralee.

The outrages lately committed in Castle
lyons, and its neighbourhood, are shocking to
humanity: About a week ago, a numerous
body of armed men surrounded the house of
the Rev. Mr. Brown, in Castleyons, fired sev
eral shots, and with horrid cries demanded
that a poor labouring man (who had taken
shelter in Mr. Brown's house) should be given
up to them. A few night's after, they seized
the poor man, stripped him stark-naked, and
inflicted the cruellest punishments on his body
with horsewhips, and on his head with sticks,
the whole way from Castleyons to Rathcor
mack, where they tied him to a stake in the
Market-House, with orders to four men to
guard him 'till nine o'clock next day, which
orders were punctually executed.

be an overturning of
the whole. He said, that he had heard it
rumoured, that the insurgents had in view
other matters, which must be destructive to the
constitution if successful; he would not give
credit for an instant to such rumours; he was
convinced the strength and energy of Govern
ment, as well as the loyalty and spirit of the
nation, was such as would crush an idea of
the kind instantly on its appearance. Govern
ment had strength and energy, but it also pos
sessed humanity, and his Lordship was happy

in that the measures of Government hitherto were
guided by that principle; he declared his con
fidence that the legislature, upon proper ap
plication and a proper conduct in the people,
would exert itself in giving them relief from
every real oppression or grievance; his Lord
ship concluded a very able and animated
speech, to which we are very far from being
able to do that justice we would wish, or which
it deserves, by recommending to the worthy
mover of the amendment, to withdraw it, as
the clergy were in such a situation that they
could not consistently unite in a petition of the
nature and tendency of that now under dis
cussion.

The motion for the amendment being with
drawn, and the original motion, and petition
being agreed to unanimously, a motion was
made (we forget by whom) that the Knights
of the Shire be requested to present the same
to the House of Commons, immediately at
their next meeting. This motion being also
agreed to unanimously, Stephen Edward Rice,
Esq; moved two resolutions, declaratory of
the abhorrence of the meeting, at any attempt,
of any description of men, to alter the consti
tution or the Laws of the Land, by open force
or secret combination; and of their deter
mined resolution to use every endeavour to
bring all such persons to the most exemplary
punishment; which being agreed to unani
mously, the Earl of Glandore moved, that the
thanks of the County be given to the Lord
Viscount Kenmare, for his spirited and success
ful exertions, in quelling the outrages lately
prevailed in this county, and particularly for
bringing the principals therein to justice; and
that the High Sheriff be requested to present a
copy of the resolution to the Noble Viscount.
Lord Glandore's motion passed also unanimous
ly. His Lordship prefaced this motion with a
very handsome eulogium on the loyalty pub
lic spirit, and affection for his country, which
so strongly appeared in every part of the noble
Viscount's conduct,—an eulogium, which we
had pleasure in hearing every gentleman bear
ample testimony to.
