Mr. Ed. Burke, made his first appearance
in public life at the time of the repeal of the
Stamp Act in the year 1766. He supported
that measure with great zeal and uncommon
abilities, and being then a young member, he
attracted the attention of the House in a most
particular and forcible manner.—His political
situation proceeded from his connection with
the Marquis of Rockingham, who had been at
that period First Lord of the Treasury. His
powers of persuasion are almost irresistible,
and enforced in a manner almost peculiar to
himself. His sources of knowledge are inex-
haustible, and his materials drawn forth with
the profoundest and most accurate judgment.
His mind abounds with a luxuriance of ima-
gery, clothed in language of the most delicate
and elegant nature. His details are always
correct, interesting, and important. His facts
are seldom assumed and when they are, he
ingeniously sounds them on certain current
opinions, perhaps controverted, but known
however to exist.—In short, few men in these
kingdoms are equal to him, but none excel
him in great and splendid abilities.

Not a doubt remains, but an adjustment of
the commerce of the two kingdoms will be
brought forward, early next session. Those
who are, or affect to be in the secret, look
upon the matter as a moral certainty, since the
arrival of the Chief Commissioner from Lon-
don. We cannot think that any minister,
however presumptuous, would bring forward
propositions conceived in the spirit of Mr.
Pitt's, that were exploded the session before
last—propositions, subversive of the constitution
and trade of Ireland—but a reciprocal adjust-
ment is to be wished for by every person who
has at heart the welfare of Ireland—at present
there is a visible inequality, to the prejudice of
this kingdom. The markets and manufacturers
of England are protected, whilst our raw ma-
terials and market lies at their mercy!

COUNTRY NEWS.
Cork, Oct. 12. A few nights ago, as Mr.
Henry O'Hea, of Rockfavage, was returning
to his own house from Clonakiity, about the
hour of eleven o'Clock, he was attacked by a
number of men, who knocked him off his
horse, trampled on him and inhumanly beat
him, calling out to murder him, for that it
was the Rev. Mr. Townsend. On Mr. O'Hea's
making himself known, they remounted him,
apologizing for mistaking him for Mr. Town-
send. Mr. Townsend's activity as a Magis-
trate, seems to have been the cause of this
daring outrage.

Yesterday in the City Court came on the
trial of Samuel Sullivan, otherwise Sammy
Sam, for burglary, and robbery, to a large
amount in March last on Giles Powell, Esq;
at Sunday's Well, when a most respectable
jury brought him in guilty, and he received
sentence of death accordingly.
Kilkenny, Oct. 14. Yesterday was commit-
ted to the county gaol, by Richard Cox, Esq;
Edward Mandeville, of Eustace Land, in the
county Tipperary, charged on the oath of
William Stacpole, parish clerk of White-
church, in the county Kilkenny, with having
on Sunday the 13th of August last, (in com-
pany with divers other riotous and disorderly
persons, of whom he was principal) seized said
Stacpole by the collar, tearing his shirt, and
dragging him by the hair and ears in a violent
manner, threatening to cut off his ears if he
did not swear the right boys oath, which he
then unlawfully administered to him; also
on several other charges of a similar nature.
