The Special Commission for this city, is postponed to Wednesday 1st November.

Saturday, the Crown Solicitor for Munster caused the following notice to be served on the prisoners in our county and City Jails.

"You, and each of you, are hereby required to take notice, that a Commission of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery, has issued for the County and City of Limerick, and will be holden at Limerick, on Wednesday, the 1st day of November next—and you and each and every of you are hereby required to take notice, that your several and respective trials will be proceeded upon on that day, immediately after the sitting of the Court; and we further give you notice, that the Gaolers of said County and City, will, on demand, furnish you with Crown Summonses gratis, to enforce the attendance of the necessary witnesses in your defence."

The Magistrates will be fined if they do not immediately return the informations they have in their possession, to the Crown Office.

The following presents a list of the capital offences that are to be tried at the Special commission on the 1st Nov.:

County Gaol—Six for murder; ten assembling by night and attacking houses; eight burglary, felony and abduction; two burning houses; six attacking on the high way and robbing; five for riot at a fair, firing shots and killing a man—Total 37.

City Gaol.—One for murder; three for attacking dwelling houses at night; four for robbery; four for attacking with intent to murder—Total 12.
