DEATH OF LURD CLARINA.

We regret to record the death of Lord Clarina, which occurred at Lawday House, Farnham, Surrey, on Friday. His lordship, who was aged \$5 had been in tailing health for some time past.

The "Times" in its obituary notice says :-"Lionel Edward Massey, fifth Baron Clarina in the peerage of feeland, was born on April 20th, 1837. He was the third son of the third peer. He served in the 4th West York Militia and the Scots Guards, retiring in 1870 with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, and was High Sheriff of Limerick in 1896. In 18 7 he succeeded his brother in the title. He was twice married, and leaves, with five daughters, one son, Captain the Hon Eyre Nathaniel Massey, Scota Guarde, who served in the South African and the European warr. Born in 1880, the new peer married, in 1906, Alige Erin, daughter of Wilton Althusen, and cousin of Mr A. H. E. Althusen, of Stoke Court, Bucks. The Clarina barony was one of the nine peerages conferred on commoners on the last day of such creations before the Irish Union, the recipient being General Egre Massey, who was wounded at Calloden, and served under Wolfe in America. He was a brother of the first Lord Маззеу,"

Lord Clarina up to some time ago was a constant resident at his pictures que seat at klm Park. For the past couple of years he had been living more or less in England. He gave considerable employment on his estate, was an extensive reason of cattle, and took a keen interest in farming generally. Of a very kindly and retiring disposition, he lived the life of a county gentleman, and took no part in public life. His demise is keenly regretted in Clarina district, and sincere sympathy is expressed here and throughout the county with his family in their bereavement.
