The Answer of JOHN TUTHILL, Esq. to the Address and Resolutions of the Freemen, Freeholders, and Citizens of the Ancient and Loyal City of Limerick.

GENTLEMEN,

I HAVE this day received your Resolutions and kind Address, calling on me to offer myself as a Candidate for the representation of this, our native city.

To be thus distinguished by your unanimous choice (did those papers contain no other expression of your good opinion) must ever be to me a source of pride and gratification, but the value is considerably heightened, when I reflect that your cause, not man, is the object.

Bound to you by all those ties and by the feeling of our common wrongs, though my sole ambition was to co-operate in the humblest ranks where my services might have found their proper place. Be quite convinced it never was my wish to be drawn from the habits of private life, and that my sole desire was that your choice may have selected some person of higher qualifications and better fitted than myself for the attainment of your rights.

It is now four years since your labours commenced and the change which has taken place is both auspicious and curious—your dawn was clouded, your efforts were then scoffed at, your motives calumniated, many of your friends were paralyzed—all these you have borne, and to these discouragements were added a profuse sacrifice of your time and of your money with a generosity which posterity may honor, but which we can never duly appreciate.

All which was then dismaying, you have by your constancy turned into hope and joy, and by your spirit, you have reversed the dismal picture, the scoff is turned into fear, the calumny is refuted, and the triumph of the laws has brought back your friends of all sects, and public confidence in the wisdom and the justice of your measures will enable you to secure the attainment and transmission of your insatiable rights—from the iron grasp of your oppressors have ye already torn many of your usurped privileges, and can one of them be found who can truly assert that you have ever sought more than the freedom of election and the fair administration of your charters, won by the blood and by the loyalty of our ancestors, and wrenched from you by the most insulting usurpation—when we asked for bread we got a stone from the hard heart of our spoilers—when we in all ways supplicated for the redress of our grievances we got insult or calumny.

When we survey the map of Ireland we find the freedom of our city scattered among the residents of every other county but our own, we find a Connaught Colony a fixed horde of aliens, outliers, and strangers hang upon our frontiers & with a menacing brow ready to march into our city to invade our
