Letters received yesterday in the city from Holland, absolutely affirm the amicable arrangements of the intestine divisions in the United Provinces to be in a fair way of speedily taking place, owing to the good offices of the Courts of London, Vienna, and Berlin.

It is confidently affirmed, that two French West Indiamen from Martinique, with valuable cargoes, have lately foundered, near the entrance of Havre de Grace.

Thursday last his Grace the Lord Primate arrived in town, and had an audience of his Grace the Lord Lieutenant.

It is very naturally supposed that the flames of war will shortly spread over Europe in general.—The discontents of the Dutch, and the confusion and almost anarchy that subsists in every province of their Republic, has already excited the particular attention of the different nations of this quarter of the globe; and if not shortly adjusted (which is indeed a circumstance highly improbable) each of the most powerful kingdoms and empires, will take an active part upon this interesting occasion, in order to answer either the purposes of their ambition, or any other private or particular motive that might immediately actuate them.

Though German, Russian and Holland linens find their way into France, yet those of Ireland must ever get a decided preference, especially those of the middle prices, or about twenty-pence a yard, as their softness and evenness make them better adapted for being stamped or stained for ladies wear than those of any other country whatever. The fabrics of Holland may be finer, but not adapted to the purposes already mentioned; those of Austria fall under a similar predicament, and the Russian fabrics of this kind are extremely coarse. The Spanish acknowledge our linens to be greatly superior to those of any other country. The treaty with France must on this account be of the greatest utility to the people of this kingdom, and will be the means of establishing that manufacture in the Southern countries, which, from their contiguity to the French coasts, must have the advantage of every part of Ireland in that particular respect.

For what should we wish for a UNION now with Britain; has she ought but taxes to offer us in exchange for a dereliction of our lately recovered independence?—It can be only some insidious attempt once more to deceive us into a traitorous commercial compact, to coerce our trade, ruin our manufactures, force the best of our people to quit their native land for a maintenance, turn our fertile fields and desolated towns into pasture lands and sheep-walks, and reduce the miserable and squalid remains of the Irish nation, into hewers of wood and drawers of water, starving shepherds and contemptible cow herds to the happier inhabitants of a sister kingdom!

The introduction of manufactures in the province of Munster would be attended with the most salutary consequences, as it must not only be the means of giving employment to great numbers of the people, but also be consequential of promoting tillage in those counties where pasturage, or the feeding of black cattle almost universally prevails, as the farmer would be ever sure of a ready market for his corn and other products of the soil. The present opportunity should not by any means be neglected, as not only our linens, but every species of our cotton fabrics, will find a ready sale in the French markets. The pottery business must also prove highly beneficial in the carrying on an intercourse with that nation, and especially as the raw materials are to be found every where in this kingdom in the greatest abundance.

Extract of a letter from Leghorn, Sept. 13.—The Barbarians continue to infest our coasts, and not a vessel arrives that has been visited.

### C O R K, Oct. 19.

Last Tuesday Daniel Sullivan, sen. and Daniel Sullivan, jun. were convicted in the County Court of aiding and assisting in an attempt to rescue Timothy O'Driscoll, (by which several were killed) and received sentence to be whipped from North to South Gaol in this city, which punishment was immediately inflicted. And,

Yesterday the said Timothy O'Driscoll, was tried and found guilty of White Boy misdemeanors, for which he was also immediately whipped from North to South Gaol, and is to undergo the like punishment in Baltimore and Skibereen.

Besides the above persons, the following were convicted in the County Court: Dennis Duane and John Daly for a capital Felony, to be hanged on the 23d of December next. William Barry for a burglary and felony to be hanged on Saturday the 28th of October, inst. Timothy Kane, John Higgins, Patrick Connor, Cornelius Mullane, Dennis Buckley, Francis Mulchinagh and Margaret Breen, for a rescue, and misdemeanors on the White Boy Act: Kane, Higgins and Connor to be whipped thro' the Main-street of Cork on Saturday next, and imprisoned five months; Mullane, Buckley and Mulchinagh, to be whipped thro' Mallow the 3d of next month and confined three months; and Margaret Breen to be imprisoned three months. Francis Allen, for a misdemeanour on White Boy Act, to be whipped thro' Dunmanway, on the 8th of November next. Maurice Neale, for uttering a forged decree, to be pillored on the 25th inst. and unprisoned one month.

### TO THE PRINTER, SIR,

Having seen an account in your Paper of Monday last, of the death of the unfortunate Lady who poisoned herself, I shall endeavour to give you a more perfect one, being of the Inquest.

Mr. H. deposed that having agreed with a chaise-man in Dublin to drive him to this city, he afterwards came to him and told him, that a Lady who was going to see her relations in Cork, would be glad to be in his company, and that he would make every thing as pleasing to her as was in his power. She was introduced to him as he sat at dinner at an Hotel, as a Miss Nicholson, from London, that they left Dublin the following morning, and on the road she told him she was subject to a complaint in her stomach and bowels, and when attacked she took peppermint tablets, and presently found ease, that she sometimes fainted, but begged him not to be alarmed nor administer any thing to her. Coming over the Curragh, he said he found himself very chilly, had a pain in his stomach and bowels, and that she gave him one of the tablets and his servant another, which agreed very well with him; during the journey they never lay together. In a town not far from Cork some Gentlemen, who he supposed to be officers, enquired of his negro boy who they were, that he said, a Mr. and Mrs. H. at which the lady seemed much displeas'd, and thought not to go to bed for that night, but by a great deal of persuasion did in a separate bed in the same room. The weather being wet the servant was in the carriage most of the time, except coming into Cork, and judging the Lady a woman of quality feared her being seen by her relations he made him sit by her.
