ISLAND OF CEYLON

Days since, we took occasion to state the probable consequences of its possession by the British, when being secured by treaty, and enterprise of Englishmen might be without the probability of disturbance. It becomes equally the duty of a Journalist to show what has been acquired by the possession of Ceylon to Great Britain.

As our possessions in India are, powerfully supported as our Indian army usually is, still without a respectable marine, confessed, these possessions, which have become an immense empire, would be a doubtful, hazard, and uncertainty. If a marine be necessary, the consideration next offers is, where a rendezvous is to be as to serve all the purposes of these coasts both of Malabar and Coromandel at the same time, if necessary should be of offence.—No one who has ever seen the coast of India, can be so ignorant as not to know when the monsoon sets in, it becomes necessary for a ship to continue in the open roadsteads; but when that season approaches, the hope of preserving the ship is by getting to sea, and patiently enduring what in this country would be deemed a most treacherous hurricane. In this season formerly, it was an invariable and indeed only resource, to be on the opposite coast, there wait until the monsoon had passed over, and then to Madras Roads, at infinite risk, and loss of time, and, in war, leaving the settlement of Madras open to the enemy by sea, if an enemy should gain the return of the naval force appeared.
