

Blanket, in consequence of bad health, return to England from the E. Indies. of respectable authority, received by mail from Lisbon late, that a contagious disease had broken out at Medina Sidonia, 17 miles S. E. of that city, and carried off 20 of the inhabitants daily. The Government, however, had taken the most prompt and efficacious means of checking its progress, by drawing a cordon of soldiers round the town of Medina, to prevent all communication with the other parts of the kingdom, and ordering the immediate employment of every possible process for successfully practising in the country by Mr. Cruikshank, of Woulton in France by the celebrated Guyton.

A bloody affray took place at Colchester Barrack on Saturday last, between the 49th Regiment of the Militia. We are happy to learn, that by the good conduct of the Officers, peace was restored the same evening before the arrival of the 31st Dragoons, who were ordered from the town, and met with the greatest alacrity. — Early in the morning, the 49th marched to Chelmsford, and the 31st Dragoon Guards attended at the town with drawn swords; and, as the Cambridge Militia marched out in procession for Norwich. So sudden were the orders, that the Brevet-Masters did not return for impressing waggons till near 11 o'clock on Thursday night; and, though some miles to come to the Barracks, many were obliged to go on the route by half-past six.

MR. MILLINGTON'S method of Preserving POTATOES, to keep good for Years.

Wash the Potatoes clean, leave them to dry, then with a Bread Grater, or a sheet of paper punched full of holes, and set in a wooden Tub. Grate them into a tub full of cold water: the tub, to draw off the water by degrees when the Pulp has settled at the bottom; then stir up the Pulp well together and put it by in small portions (viz. as much as will make, when pressed, a cake about an inch in thickness), into a cloth, and press it, either in a Cheese-press, or a common Napkin-press, until all the water is squeezed out; then put the cakes upon its edge, on a shelf to dry, and it will keep for years, and be excellent food.

When wanted for use, grate or pound it, mix it into a pudding to be baked or boiled; or mix it with water, a few Greens, a piece of Meat, or Herrings: or if it should not be wanted for the food of Man, it may be mixed with water and given to Cattle, Hogs, and Poultry.
