Summer Time Expires To-night.

Summer time ends and Greenwich time will be restored at 3 a.m. to-morrow (Sunday), when the clock will be set at 2 a.m., so that the hour 2.3 a.m. summer time will be followed by the hour 2.3 a.m. Greenwich time.

All timepieces should be set to the correct Greenwich time during the course of the night.

Railways and other establishments where work continues during the night will no doubt make the change at the correct moment, but the public generally should alter their clocks and watches before going to bed, so that they may be right in the morning. Employers are asked especially to instruct their employes to do so.

RATES PROSECUTION.

At the City District Court last evening the city rate collectors had proceedings instituted against a hundred persons for arrears of rates. Settlements were, it was stated, made in several cases, and in others decrees were granted by the District Justice.
