CO. CORK MURDER.

Tailor Shot Dead.

A shocking crime, which is believed to be the outcome of agrarian trouble, occurred at Ballyrobin, Churchtown, Co. Cork, on Sunday night, when Edward Donovan, a tailor, was shot dead at about 8.30 o'clock while standing on the street.

His son, aged about 16, ran to the village of Cloyne, some miles away, and told the Civic Guard there that his father had been fired at and wounded. When Dr Murphy, of Cloyne, went to Ballyrobin he found that the man was dead.

It is believed that he was fired at from behind a ditch opposite his house. Two or three shots were heard, and he was struck in the head.

Donovan was an inoffensive man, and lived in a thatched cottage, where he had his tailoring shop. He owned about half an acre of land at the rear of the house.

Detectives from Cork are investigating the matter.
