CULTURE OF SUGAR BEET.

Culture of sugar beet has been taken up in the Saorstát in the 10 years, and it is very satisfactory to see that the movement bids fair to be a very stimulating factor in the development of agriculture and the development of industrial enterprise in this country. The manufacture of sugar at Carlow, the production of which was started towards the end of January in the present year, is now approaching completion, and is expected to be officially opened on the 1st of the next month. The National Convention of the Irish Labour Party Trades Union Congress visited Carlow last Thursday, and some very interesting and important information was obtained as to the scope and object of the enterprise. M. Theodor Hayek, technical director of the company, who, at the outset, paid a high tribute to the aptitude of Irish labour employed on the building, went on to state that the factory would give employment to 400 workers when in operation. The total output could be an average annual output of 100,000 tons of granulated white sugar, and this could be even higher. It is very encouraging to learn from an expert such as M. Hayek that the sugar content is very satisfactory. That bears out what has been said again and again as to the suitability of the soil and climate of this country for the growing of sugar beet, and the fact that very many farmers are now directing their attention to this crop, is a further proof of their faith in the success of the enterprise.

CITY MOTOR ACCIDENT.

Youth Fatally Injured.

A young fellow named Christopher Walsh, aged eleven years, of Vize's Field, was knocked down by a motor car in O'Connell street yesterday evening. The young fellow with another boy was crossing the street, and were evidently behind a lorry when the motor approached. As Walsh was about to dash across he was struck by the car which was driven by Dr Cremin, Newcastle West, and received serious injuries to the body. He was immediately removed in the car that knocked him to Barrington's Hospital.

The boy succumbed to his injuries at half past eight o'clock last night. He had a fracture of the ribs and laceration of the right lung.

An inquest is being held this evening by Mr J. S. McNeill, City Coroner.

The Inquest.

The inquest was adjourned until four o'clock on Tuesday evening by the Coroner, on the application of Inspector O'Mahony, who stated the principal witness, Dr Cremin, the driver of the car, informed him by phone from Dublin that he could not attend in time to-day.

Evidence of identification was given by the boy's father, Patrick Walshe; and the testimony of Dr Ernest O'Mahony, acting house surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, was that death was due to shock and hæmorrhage caused by a fracture of the base of the skull.

A man named Ernest Richards, a labourer, stated he was coming from the Labour Exchange at 3.30 yesterday, and saw this car passing; it was driven on its wrong side of the road. It was going at the rate of from 20 to 25 miles an hour, and it struck the boy and knocked him. The car conveyed the boy to Barrington's Hospital. There was no traffic at the time of the accident.
